INTRODUCTION.

An army has officers. Christ's army is the Church, and its officers——? The clergy. Now the Collect of today teaches us to pray for them. What are they to do? Prepare for Christ's second coming just as St. John the Baptist did for His first coming. We pray for them today especially because this is one of the four Ember weeks during which the Church prays especially for her ministers. At this time men who want to be Christ's ministers are examined as to their fitness, and next Sunday those found fit will be ordained or commissioned.

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I ORIGIN

- 1. **Commenced by Christ**. Who called disciples and then chose twelve to be apostles (St. Luke 6:12-17), and at last sent them out with His commission and authority to work in His Name (St. John 20:21-24).
- 2. **Continued by Apostles**. Who ordained deacons (Acts 7), and also elders (Acts 14:23), and when they were soon to leave this world, ordained bishops to carry on their work (2 Tim.1:6, Titus 1:5).

II. ORDERS.

- 1. **Ranks or degrees of Office**. In the Jews' religion, they had high priests, priests, and Levites. In Christ's time there was Christ Himself, apostles and disciples. In the apostles' time there were elders and deacons. Now the three chief orders are called—bishops, priests, and deacons.
- 2. **How are they appointed?** a. First they are *called by God*. God puts it into men's hearts, and guides their lives, and so shows them that He wants them to serve Him as His ministers. b. Then *they are chosen* when they have been examined both as to character and learning and found fit for the work (I Tim 3:10). c. Finally they are *commissioned* by those in authority in the church. This is called ordination, when the bishops lay hands on those to be ordained, and God gives them His Holy Spirit to enable them to fulfill their work. A man may be a good soldier but he is not an officer until he has received a commission. A man may be a good lawyer, but he is not a judge unless he is appointed by those in authority. So it is not a man's fitness but his ordination which actually makes him a bishop, priest, or deacon.
- III. OFFICE. All have to prepare Christ's way; to warn people against sin; to help them to live holy lives; to bring them to Christ; and to help them to be like Christ.
- 1. **A bishop has to** *rule***.** He is the head or chief of what is called a diocese (Acts 20:17-28, I Peter 5:1-2)
- 2. **A priest has to** *feed* God's people, which he does chiefly by preaching and reading God's Word, and by ministering the Sacraments (Acts 6:2-3, St. Matthew 10:7, 2 Timothy 2:24-25, and 3:2)
- 3. A deacon has to serve; to help the priest in his work.

Officers are in most danger. The enemy tries hardest to kill them. So the devil tries most of all to tempt God's ministers, and therefore we must always pray for them.

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
